# Toby's Tech Tip By Toby Silhavy

Well everyone its been a couple of issues since my last article so I want to revamp the pace and the tips that this column can provide. I hope you like this topic and I am open to any topics you may want to see in future columns. Please drop me a line at torqueroller2000@yahoo.com I would be glad to here from you!

Well I have spent the last several months teaching myself programming in a few different computer languages and this article is the beginning of how this knowledge will help IMAC to stay safe and to protect our valuable aircraft. In this first article I would like to introduce everyone to my favorite tech item and that is telemetry. I know a lot of you say, yeah I don't need it or I wont use it but I saw a plane this summer get saved by said telemetry and another would have saved his aircraft if a simple \$10 DIY sensor had been added to his plane. Plain and simple



people telemetry is useful and we should all try to embrace it. So from here on out I'm going to show you the grass roots on how to make simple cheap telemetry sensors that will save your \$2500 engine from cooking itself all the way up to altimeters or honestly anything your mind can come up with. All you will need is a cheap soldering iron and a willingness to learn your transmitter and how it communicates with it's receiver(s).



This first sensor will be enough to gain some common knowledge about electronics and where to look for resources. I would like to thank RC-THOUGHTS.COM and Tero Salminen for providing such good articles and YouTube content. I have started a journey of Learning and I hope you come along for the ride. Here WE GO!!!!

Project #1 and simple twin cylinder head temp sensor. Yes, you quad guys this will lead to a quad cylinder version



as well. Although I will be demonstrating how this applies to JETI programming and sensors, the concepts apply to all other TX brands. We just got to apply ourselves a little and that Spektrum and Futaba radio will be singing as well!!!!





First off I will try to show all the items I used to make this sensor. I try to buy items from Amazon but have bought items from Aliexpress as well if I can wait to obtain the item. Many of the tasks of programming are done using Arduino code and the Arduino board programmer or IDE is free for download from Arduino.cc. I personnally use the Arduino 2.0 software (free) and Visuino programmer as well (this costs around \$50).



For the simple JETI twin cyclinder setup I use the following equipment

- 1. Arduino Pro Mini 3.3 volt board \$7
- 2. 3-5 volt Max6675 thermocouple Module and K type thermocouple temp sensor
- 3. 12" 20 ga r/c connector and some 20 ga wire from connector
- 4. Fine soldering iron and accessories
- 5. JETI Tx (eventually all other TX as well)
- 6. Patience

I will wet your appetite with a few pics until next time when we get down to the meat and potatoes of DIY sensors!!!!

## Latin America Regional Director Oliver Soto





IMAC LATIN AMERICA'S STARTERS LEAGUE

A new year begins, and it carries a whole new package of challenges both in sanitary and in economic terms.

These challenges require us to figure out ways to overcome overly high expenses and unnecessary risks. This became the next challenge to overcome itself.

Thus, the IMAC Starters league was born.

This is the brother league of the regular IMAC league, giving the newcomers the chance to learn directly from some of the best pilots and judges from the regular league.











Its goals are:

- a) Discover new talents disregarding the age or renown of the pilot (we have had some great surprises from pilots over 60 years old)
- b) Create a line of new coming non flying judges.
- c) Promote aerobatics for pilots that want to join the regular league soon in the future or just want to have a great day

But, what's different about it?





Well, for starters, this league consists of single day contests which can be run on a very low budget ranging from 3 to 5 dollars an entry, making it appealing for both contestants and hosts.

These features made it possible to schedule a very satisfying number of Starters League Boot Contests for 2022: 21 contests so far just for 4 states in central Mexico alone. North and south regions are still pending to confirm the dates in which they will hold their own boot contests.

About the classes themselves: each class will distinguish from the others by the type and/or size of the planes that will be allowed in that particular class.

The classes we're running are:

- -Novel High Wing: Trainer airplanes ranging .40 cu in to 19cc.
- -Novel Low Wing: Low wing airplanes ranging .40 cu in to 19cc.
- -Novel L: Airplanes ranging 20cc a 50cc
- -Novel XL: Airplanes with engines 55cc or larger
- -Special: Bipes, twin engines, pushers, jets, warbirds and so on as needed.



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As you can tell, the goal is the newcomers depend as little as possible on the size, type or cost of gear they fly to actually show his or her flight quality.

Instead of focusing in increasing difficulty throughout classes, all the classes in the Starters league fly the exact same maneuvers.

The pilots will fly just 6 maneuvers instead of the regular 10 we fly in IMAC, not including until now those maneuvers which execution or criteria makes them hard to achieve by a certain type of airplane or which are plainly overwhelming for newcomers.

The maneuvers and the order they will be flown at was purposely chosen to fit small glow and gas engines and even some underpowered airplanes, allowing them to slowly build altitude to avoid unnecessary risks or plainly running out of it.

Also, the maneuvers already include the name of the maneuver printed in the Aresti flimsy to standardize the names for the maneuvers avoiding local or regional slang.

Why people will feel motivated to join the Starters league?

As mentioned above besides being a





(very) affordable way to initiate in IMAC, also:

- -Knocks out the need to spend top dollar getting a big airframe to be competitive or to aspire to grab a position among the top 3 at any contest and in a national and international level as well.
- -Eliminates the need to travel long distances to get that particular taste that comes with competition.
- -Schedules plenty of opportunities making it easier to choose a date that fits the particular needs for any given pilot.
- -As we all know, improves greatly the flight quality of the contestant no matter which kind of airplanes he or she flies on a regular basis.
- -The fact that there are several classes to choose from builds plenty of opportunities to achieve a good place by the end of the contest.
- -Official recognition from the IMAC Organization and renown in the website.
- -On top of it all, we developed a Traveler Assistance Program, in which pilots coming from distant places or abroad get the chance to borrow the giant scale planes the local pilots in each venue provide.

How the Starters league can help improve the regular IMAC league in the region?

Pilots flying in the Starters League will have a timeframe at least one year long to begin building either confidence or an airplane that fits better in the regular league contests while they're already competing at several venues and dates.

So far, 2 countries have adopted the use of the Starters league as a mean to recruit new pilots for the regular IMAC league:
México and Colombia.

México is already running full steam ahead while Colombia is going to run the tests and schedule their dates later next month.

And, how is it coming along?

Our results in the test conducted in January 2022 are very flattering. The invitation for the trial contest was released just 36 hours prior to the scheduled date.

Nevertheless, 7 new to the sport pilots and 2 new coming judges showed up traveling from 3 different states and bringing planes ranging from small electric/glow sport planes to medium sized gassers.

After inquiring further, we learnt they have been wanting to compete for a long time, but they felt overwhelmed by the usual reasons (amount of scheduled dates, distances to travel, length of contests, size of planes usually found in the regular season and so on)

What was the lesson brought by the trial contest?

People crave to give IMAC a try!

It's up to us to give more options to deal with the needs our pilots have.

The only question I can think of is, why not?

We're literally (Quoting Adi Kochav's words) bringing the world together one figure at a time!

**IMAC EUROCUP 2022** 

IMAC EUROCUP, www.ImacEurope. com, is the IMAC European Region annual championship, that is structured on a certain number of Open International competition taking place in several Countries within the Region. At the moment, the IMAC Europe Region comprehends 25 Countries. Each year, the number of Open International competitions belonging to the EuroCup may vary, according to the availability of the Countries to organize such complex events. Pilots do not need to participate to all the EuroCup competitions in order to win the championship. Each year, based on the number of Open International competitions offered, we decide the number of possible draws, in order to minimize potential travel costs. The normalized scores achieved by each pilot at the minimum number valid competitions are summed up, originating a final championship ranking that is finally normalized again.







Covid has significantly damaged and slowed the organizational capabilities of several Countries. Therefore, this year, the first real after-Covid year, the EuroCup will be made of only five competitions, of which two could be draw. As a consequence, this year, an excellent pilot could participate to only three competitions and win the championship.

Within the Region, the Countries who enjoy the organizational capability to offer Open International events of this magnitude are the UK, Spain, France, Switzerland, Germany, the Nordic Region

(Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland), Italy, Czech Republic, Turkey, Israel and Poland. This year, only Switzerland, Italy, Germany, Czech Republic and Poland have been able to organize EuroCup Open International competitions.

All these events take place applying the full IMAC regulation. The only exception is that the Basic class is not represented, as the availability to host pilots is limited. All these competitions have a participation level ranging from 40 to 90 pilots. At the Caorle event, at the moment, 83 pilots have already registered from 14 Countries. At all these three days Open International competitions, two unknown flights are flown. Based on participation level, we manage from two to three concurrent flight lines each time. The level of participation at the free style class is always very high, providing an interesting international exposition of the



best free style pilots active in Europe.

Thanks to the automatization of the scoring system, provided by the Notauscore technology, adopted by all the organizing Countries, we are now in the position to minimize the organizational costs. This has been of great help. In addition, the possibility of providing each pilot a real time view of all scores in his mobile phone, is a feature that is greatly appreciated.

The EuroCup is the evolution of the European Acrocup, a tournament invented by Klaus Dettmer, a German airmodeller very passionate for semi-scale aerobatics, who has been greatly effective at promoting the practice in Europe until 2012. Unfortunately he passed away a few years ago. In his effort he has been supported by DMFV, www.dmfv.aero, the most important German airmodelers federation. This is the reason why we continue to manage the IMAC EuroCup, which is an evolution of the European AcroCup, in partnership with DMFV. At the moment, the coordinator of the IMAC EuroCup is Klaus Dettmer, a very passionate German Pilot operating within our Euro-Team.

I believe these International competitions are very important to keep the IMAC passion growing, as they provide a tangible and practical International perspective to all the local IMAC competitions that are happening in each Country every year. They also enabled to grow a very effective cadre of IMAC International Judges.

We really hope that after this Covid bump, more Countries will get back on their feet, providing the EuroCup with more alternative Open International competitions. It is just a matter of bouncing back. We have to be patient and work.

It is to be noticed that all these Open International events are Really Open. This means that any pilot from any other part of the world, also outside the IMAC Europe Region, is warmly invited.

This year, 2022, seems to be a come back year. We will see how it will roll out.
